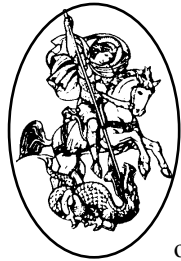

Pastor's Corner

The first major Feast of the Holy Orthodox Church after the New Year is the Feast of Theophany on January 6. In it the Church commemorates the Theophany or the Epiphany of our Lord God and Savior Jesus Christ. In essence the word "theophany" means a divine manifestation or revelation.

As the man, Jesus of Nazareth, drew near to be baptized by John in the Jordan River, those present saw just that, only a man. At His descent into the waters, the heavens opened and the Holy Spirit in the form of a dove appeared along with the voice of the Father saying, "This is my beloved Son, with Whom I am well pleased!"

Jesus, the man, is thus "manifested" or "revealed" to be Jesus, the Son of God. In this manifestation the whole of creation rejoices. For in this union of the Creator-God with human flesh in the person of Jesus Christ is the restoration of God to His fallen creation.

Jesus did not need to be baptized because of any sin or imperfection. Nothing happened to Him as He descended into the water. But, by His action Jesus, the Son of God, shows that He desires to enter into every aspect of human existence, even humbly submitting to baptism for remission of sins, although having none Himself!

Indeed, there is no change in Jesus, but there is still a change. The change is in the water into which He descends and by extension to all of creation. It is for this reason that the Church invokes the descent of the Holy Spirit to bless water and make it "holy" on this Feast Day. Water is necessary for "physical" life. Without it, we physically die. "Holy"

water is necessary for our true "spiritual" life, the life that provides for our ultimate vitality.

During this Theophany season, as this "Holy" water of life is brought into your household, may it be for the total renewal of your family's life in Christ and by extension the renewal of life in our parish.

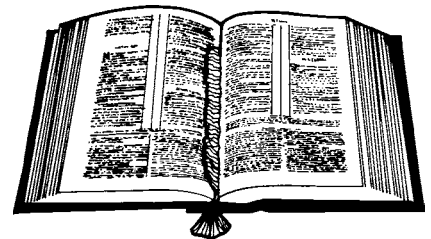
Annual Parish Meeting

The Messiah

In this season of the Epiphany or Theophany of Jesus Christ, it is important to look at this as a renewal of ourselves and those around us in understanding our faith. The season of the Nativity is celebrated to help us understand that God himself took on flesh, the Second Person of the Trinity, not changing the Trinity at all. The Second Person of the Trinity, the Son, became man to begin his ministry of redeeming us. John the Baptist was the last of the Old Testament prophets. He lived in the wilderness of Judea and was believed by some to be Elijah. The Jews believed that Elijah would return before the Messiah. John wore garments of camel hair and a leather belt, as did Elijah as described in the Old Testament book of 2 Kings 1:8. However, John warned of the Day of Judgment which precedes the coming of the kingdom. He preached to repent and turn away from evil. John of course was baptizing Jews and telling of the coming of the Messiah. John was in awe when Jesus submitted to baptism by him. This is the manifestation of God and the beginning of his public ministry and also the revelation of the Trinity. If we remember, Jesus, the Son, baptized and then the Holy Spirit in the form of a dove comes down upon Him and then God says this is my beloved Son, with Whom I am well pleased. Here we see the three Persons of the Trinity, the one God. The actual translation is God saying that this is the Son of My love. If we understand in the beginning the Trinity is pure love.



God did not create man because God needed to be loved, it was the other way around. Because God the Trinity is pure love, He created man and all the creatures of the universe. This is why we see so many different creatures in nature because of God's love. He created all that could be because of Love. God did not need to be loved by His creation because the Trinity is Love; but what God creates he loves and therefore, when creation fell away from Him through sin and temptation, through his love the Trinity did everything in its power to bring creation back. We find this in the prayer of the anaphora that describes God doing everything to bring us back from the fall.

Jesus identified himself with our sinful condition and the fall of the world. It must be understood that Jesus is not sinful, but he remained perfect in a sinful world. Christ redeemed mankind and the world from evil. His baptism is a sign of redemption. We must remember Christ was not baptized for His sake but for ours. Just as Jesus was baptized, so Israel was baptized in the Red Sea; Jesus fasted for 40 days and was tempted by the devil; the Israelites of the Old Testament were in the desert for 40 years and were tempted by the devil and fell to his temptation through doubt and disobedience. The new Israel in Jesus Christ brings to us an Israel of faith and obedience; whereas the Old Testament Israel is an Israel of doubt and disobedience. Satan tempted Christ three times while in the desert in order to exploit the Lord. He wanted Jesus to doubt and renounce His Divine Sonship. As we saw with Adam and Eve, they were tempted and placed their physical needs above the spiritual. After Jesus was hungry the devil tempted him with the need for bread, but Jesus was not tempted; and then Satan said, if you are the Son of God.... call upon the Angels (as in Psalm 91). Again Jesus would not be tempted. The third time the devil, imitating God, claiming he was going to give wealth to Jesus, wealth that was not Satan's to give. Satan attempted to get Jesus to call the Angels down which would have given Satan power over Jesus and Jesus or course did not do this. Yet after this God the Father sent angels to minister to Jesus. The importance of this is that God sent the Angels without Jesus asking. He sent angels to minister to the Son because of Love, just as God cares for us through Love. St. John Chrysostom writes, "we must overcome the devil, not by miracles, but the forbearance and

long-suffering and do nothing for display and vainglory.

The great rejoicing and celebration that occurs during the Nativity and Baptism of Jesus Christ is due to His bringing light to the world. After the fall of Adam and Eve, God's creation fell into darkness because it became sinful. With the birth of Jesus Christ, Jesus brought us the Light for He is the Light of the world. The first line of the Great Doxology that we chant at the end of Matins and just before the beginning of the Divine Liturgy: "Glory to Thee who has shown us the Light; Glory be to God in the highest, and on earth peace and goodwill among men." This is the phrase we sing throughout the Christmas season Glory to God in the highest and peace, goodwill among men. So at this time of rejoicing and thanksgiving for the coming of the Messiah, let us reach out to others to come and experience the joy of the coming of the Lord.

In the adult class we will be learning about the Angels. What type of creatures are the Angels. Learn about our guardian angels and about the role of the Angels throughout history. Non-Orthodox are understanding more and more the role of angels in Christianity. This new discovery is an old tradition of the Orthodox Church. So come on Sunday mornings and learn about the angels of God, the heavenly hosts.

Getting to Know the Order of St. Ignatius

St. Ignatius was one of the first Bishops of the See of Antioch, the spiritual source of our Archdiocese. He was a witness for Christ by his life and deeds and serves as a model for all members of the Order.

Jesus sanctioned financial giving when he honored the poor widow who gave her last two coins. The Order only asks that we give from our surplus.

The money goes to departments in the Archdiocese such as missions and evangelism, youth ministry, campus ministry, Christian education, as well as camping scholarships, college conference scholarships, the Antiochian Village, Teen SOYO Special Olympics, married seminarian assistance, and clergy retirement. Outside the Archdiocese, the Order continues to Project Mexico, International Orthodox Christian charities, Orthodox Christian Fellowship and other worthy needs around the world.

So next time you see a member wearing the cross with the red ribbon, it does not mean they are "showing off". The cross and ribbon serves as our witness to Christ and a reminder of Him who accepted the cross for our salvation. The crimson of the ribbon recalls the blood which the martyr Ignatius shed for Christ. The cross and ribbon remind us that Sacrificial giving is our obligation as an Antiochian Orthodox Christian. N

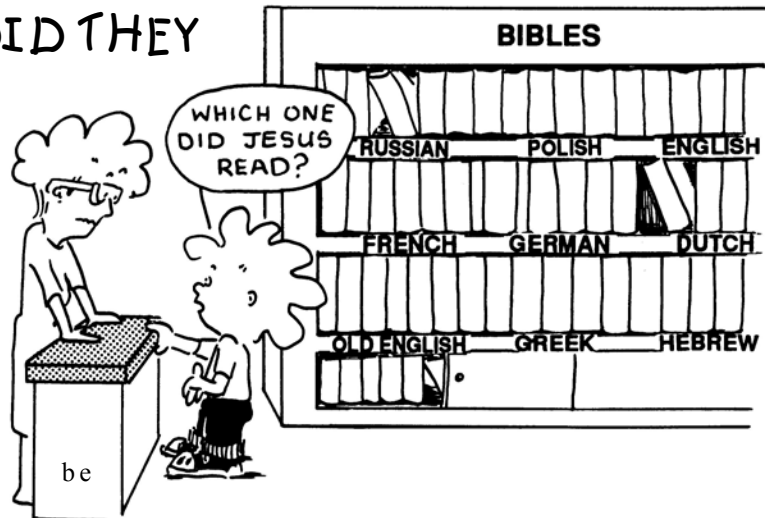

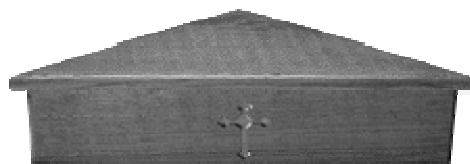

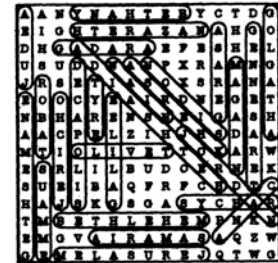
